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AUGUST

Dr. Shirley Anne Jackson is an inventor and theoretical physicist. She was the first Black woman to receive a Ph.D. from MIT and holds more than 50 honorary degrees. Her research led to inventions such as the touch-tone phone, caller ID, and call waiting. Trailblazers like Dr. Jackson are important because students of all backgrounds and identities should see themselves represented in STEM careers. The beginning of the school year is the ideal time to make sure your curriculum and classroom library include diverse and inclusive representation.
